Shopping is especially enjoyable at the pedestrian zone of Stroget, where you'll find well-known brands in the many attractive stores and boutiques. From Stroget emanates a maze of narrow side streets with small cozy cafés and bars and many trendy shops. Copenhagen's Latin Quarter surrounds the old campus of Copenhagen University and brims with pedestrians, cafés and bookshops.

Students have a lot of choice when going out in Copenhagen. The cuisine available offers great variety and ranges from sushi, colorful Thai food and French delicacies to typical Danish specialties. Nightlife in Copenhagen is very exciting and has just about everything from cozy bars to trendy night clubs. Especially fun is a visit to the Tivoli – an amusement park right in the center of town.

Students who are interested in cultural activities will find many things to do in Copenhagen. The Nationalmuseet (the National Museum) is a must-see for anyone who wants a comprehensive grounding in Danish history and culture. Worth a visit is also the Museum of Modern Art in Humlebaek.
